Enquiry 4: Why do Christians call the day Jesus died 'Good Friday'?		
Children:	Examples:	
MUST - Identify key information about Christianity - Recall key events of Holy Week - Understand that Christians believe Jesus died on the cross and came back to life - Recognise that Christian beliefs about Jesus come from the Bible	- Name key information about Christianity: - God (one God) - place of worship (church) - holy book (Bible) - followers (Christians) - founder (Jesus Christ) - Sequence key events, such as placing Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, Good Friday and Easter Sunday in the correct order - State the belief, such as saying that Christians believe Jesus died on the cross (crucifixion) and rose again (resurrection) - Recall the source, such as saying that the story of Holy Week comes from the Bible or retelling part of the story from the Gospels	
SHOULD Describe what the events of Holy Week show Christians about Jesus. - Explain what Christians believe about Jesus' death and resurrection - Understand why these events are important to Christians - Make links between Holy Week events and Christian beliefs such as forgiveness, sacrifice and hope	- Refer to the Last Supper, crucifixion and resurrection when describing Christian beliefs that Jesus forgives, saves and brings hope. Describe Christian beliefs that Jesus died to save people (salvation) and rose again to bring hope. - Give reasons for importance, such as Christians remembering these events every year during Easter and through practices like Communion - Connect ideas, such as linking betrayal to forgiveness, crucifixion to sacrifice and resurrection to hope	
COULD - Explain why Christians call Good Friday "good" - Compare how different Christians understand the meaning of Good Friday - Explain how beliefs about Good Friday influence how Christians live - Give and justify a personal response to the idea that something sad can also be good	- Give reasoning, such as saying Christians believe Jesus' death brings salvation and hope, even though it is a sad event - Explain different viewpoints, such as how some Christians focus on sacrifice while others focus on forgiveness or God's plan. Describe the impact, such as Christians forgiving others, showing kindness or remembering Jesus through worship and Communion. - Express a justified view, such as explaining whether something can be both sad and good and supporting this with reasons
